5931**Love in the digital age: An investigation of partner-related facebook use**

The purpose of the study was to measure how relationship satisfaction and attachment style were related to partner-related Facebook use with the aim of exploring individual's partner-related Facebook use on a Turkish sample. 336 participants; who are between the ages 20–40, in a romantic relationship currently, have a FB account and have a romantic partner who has a FB account; participated in the study. Besides the informed consent form; Demographic Information Form, Relationship Assessment Scale (RAS) to measure romantic relationship satisfaction, Experiences in Close Relationships- Revised (ECR-R) to measure adult attachment style and Partner-related Facebook Use Scale (PRFU) to evaluate different dimensions of partner-related FB use were utilized for this study. It was hypothesized that relationship satisfaction will be predicted by partner-related FB use. It was stated that attachment styles, gender and relationship-related demographic variables will be related to partner-related FB use. Similar to expectation, relationship satisfaction was predicted by some dimensions of partner-related FB use. Also, attachment styles and relationship-related demographic variables; total number of relationships and relationship status; were related to partner-related FB use. Specifically, more numbers of total relationships, being married and avoidant attachment was related to lower usage of partner-related FB. On the other hand, anxious attachment was related to higher levels of partner-related FB use. Contrary to expectations, there was no difference between men and women. The findings were discussed and clinical implications were made for the researchers and clinicians.

5632**Communication barriers and facilitators that influence in couple interaction**

Communication as an exchange process of verbal and non-verbal messages (C. Hendrick & S. Hendrick, 2000; Kimble et al., 2002; Nina, 1991; Pearson, 1993; Shannon, 1948; Satir, 1984; Watzlawick, Beavin & Jackson, 1991) involves two important aspects: Previous thoughts (cognition) before emitting messages

and the behavior that is used to emit the message (Baxter & Braithwaite, 2008; C. Hendrick & S. Hendrick, 2000). Previous research has found that negative interactions affect different areas in couple relationships (e.g. Duran, 2012; Stanley, Markman & Whitton, 2002); therefore, it is important to know what cognitive and behavioral aspects from the communication process influence the development of negative couple interactions in both men and women. 350 volunteers participated (45.6% men, 54.4% women), with an average age of 38.59 years (SD = 11.77), who had lived with their couple for at least a year. Four scales from the Couple Communication Inventory (Villanueva, 2012) were applied: The Communication Barriers and Facilitators Scale, the Personal Communication Style Scale, and from the Interaction Communication Scale the Negative Competitive Interaction and Equitable Interaction factors were used. By means of a linear regression, results show that whenever men and women perceive negative characteristics/attitudes from their partner such as annoyance, mistreatment, bad mood, among other, the interaction becomes a negative competition. Results also suggest that in the absence of such attitudes the interaction becomes equative. On the other hand, when a woman believes that her couple does not complement her, the interaction becomes more competitive; contrary to men, who think that whenever their couple complements them the interaction becomes more equative. Therefore, in order to improve the interaction, people should avoid negative attitudes/characteristics and promote complementing each other as a couple.

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4479**Family adaptation and cohesion in families with child suffering with type 1 diabetes**

In this study family cohesion and adaptation in families where child suffers with first type diabetes were analyzed. The sample consists of 23 mothers, 4 fathers and 21 adolescents. Participants were asked to pass the following surveys: method of diagnosis of the attitude to the child's illness (DOBR; Kagan, Zhuravleva), the scale of perceived stress-10 (ShVS-10), validated by Ababkov, the Big-5 method (for parents) or Trier questionnaire (for adolescents), the questionnaire "Parent- child interaction (VRR)" by Markovskaya, Lazarus coping test, questionnaire «Scale of family

adaptation and cohesion (FACES-3 Questionnaire/Olson test)», a questionnaire of everyday stress and stressors associated with diabetes. The study showed that the child's illness affects every family members', including the patient himself and his parents, but also family functioning in general. Type 1 diabetes influences the whole family system, which has to encounter such problem. Specific stress determines family functioning. Family cohesion, according to parents, was under the impact of diabetes-related stressors, experienced by themselves. Moreover, stressors experienced by their child influenced family cohesion, according to parents. Diabetes-related stressors determines family cohesion according to adolescents' rates, as well as stress, perceived by their parents. Different stressors, experienced by adolescents, became predictors of family adaptation according to their own rates, as well as several parents' stressors.

3740**The mediating role of work-family balance between marital relationship satisfaction and happiness**

The purpose of this study is to investigate whether the work-family balance mediates the relation between marital relationship satisfaction and happiness for husbands and wives both working. Marital relationship satisfaction can affect the level of happiness. For couples both working, how beneficial they perceive with regards to making the work-family balance can mediate the path from marital relationship satisfaction to happiness. How satisfied they are in their relationship can positively influence their work-family balance, and in turn how well they manage their work-family life can affect their happiness. These structural relations are analyzed in this study. Especially, because husbands and wives are in a special relationship heavily affecting each other, this study examines the actor effect and the partner effect using the Actor-Partner Interdependence Model (APIM). The Panel Study on Korean Children (PSKC) data were utilized for this study. Three waves from 7th wave to 9th wave of the data were utilized to explore longitudinal dyadic relations ($N = 1670$). The results showed that the work-family balance mediated the relations between marital relationship satisfaction and happiness for both wives and husbands. Also, there were both actor and partner effects among marital relationship satisfaction, work-family balance, and happiness for both wives and husbands, except the partner effect of husband's marital relationship
